While this process can be time-consuming, it is a crucial step in ensuring the quality and impact of the research. It's important to support the researchers in this phase and provide them with the necessary resources, time, and guidance to help them meet the publication target. Q2: Publishing research projects can be time-consuming and challenging process, varying greatly with each journal's requirements. A significant number of faculty members who have completed their research find themselves in the throes of preparing their manuscripts for publication. To facilitate this process, a comprehensive action-up plan has been proposed. This plan entails: a) Conducting a writeshop that provides faculty members the opportunity to craft their research findings into a formal suitable for publication; b) Offering dedicated mentoring support to faculty researchers, particularly almed at those in the process of writing for publication. Q3: In this 3rd quarter, only 3 research projects have been published externally, which equates to 3 out of 10 (30%), or 5.7% out of 19% requirement.
